# Policy engagement

- (Public / Health) Policy
  - Statement of intent
  - Set of actions (or intentional inaction) to achieve goals/address problems
  - Addressing populations, usually via programmes
- Policy engagement
  - Using academic evidence, expertise, and experience to inform and enhance policy decisions
  - ‘Evidence gap’ ... ‘Messiness of reality’

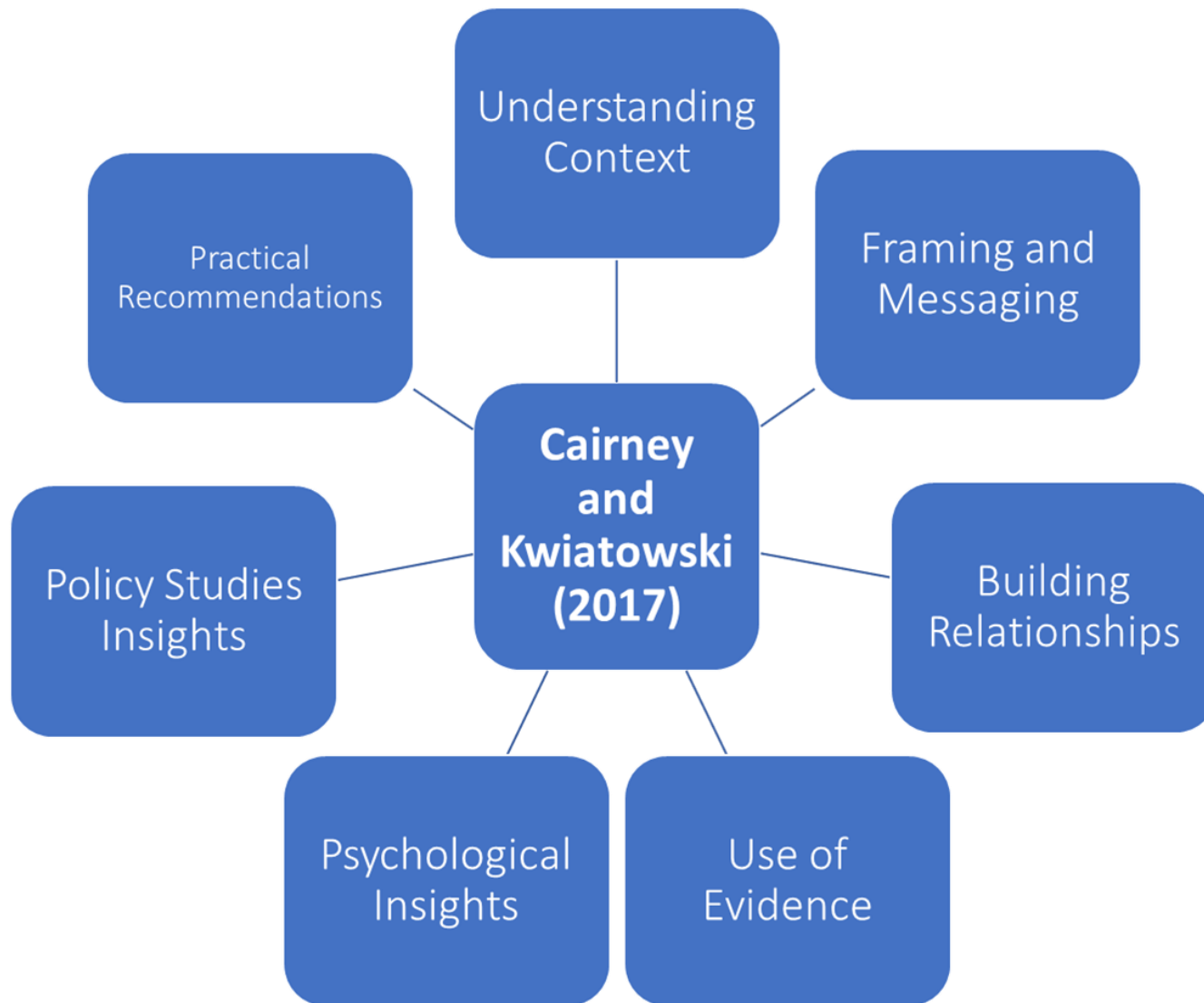

## Oliver and Cairney (2019)... Eight recommendations

- (1) Do high quality research;
- (2) make your research relevant and readable;
- (3) understand policy processes;
- (4) be accessible to policymakers: engage routinely, flexible, and humbly;
- (5) decide if you want to be an issue advocate or honest broker;
- (6) build relationships (and ground rules) with policymakers;
- (7) be 'entrepreneurial' or find someone who is; and
- (8) reflect continuously: should you engage, do you want to, and is it working?

# Accessibility

- You
- Your work
  - Framing
  - Narratives and stories
  - Clarity and simplicity
  - Repetition and reinforcement
  - Feedback mechanisms

# Politics

- Socio-political factors / context
  - e.g. GP Access
- Cycles

# Capturing impact

- Submit to enquiries
- Ask policy maker contacts
- REF / Impact Officers

## Start thinking about this now...

- What is potentially useful about your research?
  - Who might benefit from knowing about it?
  - Familiar and mundane to you? Not to others!
  - Record, capture, share...
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- Policy engagement is dynamic, relational, cumulative – multi-dimensional skill
